Course Description: HUM 140—In this course, students will study the many facets of folklore in the Appalachian region of the United States including: folk customs, material culture, performing folk arts, and oral literature.

Course Objectives: The objectives of this course are: 1) to provide an understanding of folklore in general and Appalachian folkways in particular and 2) to develop a deeper understanding of and appreciation for Appalachia and Appalachians.

Course Requirements:

1. Attendance: Each student is expected to attend class regularly and participate in class discussions.

2. Exams: There will be two exams. Each exam will consist of short answer, fill-in the blank, and multiple-choice questions. The exam dates are **April 28** and **June 2**.

3. Book Review: Each student is required to write a book review. You may select a book from the list provided (refer to pages) or you may select a book of your choice. In the latter case, the instructor must approve the book. The book review should follow a standard format, including a bibliographical citation (author, book title, place of publication, publisher, and date).

Example:

Eaton, Allen Hendershott. *Handicrafts of the Southern Highlands*. NY: Dover Publications, 1937. (370 pages)

Book reviews should be 4-pages double-spaced. A typed paper is preferred, however, any hand-written reports must be legible. Book reviews are due **June 9**, although, you may submit reviews earlier if you wish. Unless there is a valid reason such as illness, late reviews will not be accepted.

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A good book review should contain the following points:

- A. <u>What is the book about?</u> Provide a brief summary of the book, describing the main theme of the book, major events, their significance and (if there are any) main character(s).
- B. <u>What are the major theses?</u> How does the author defend these theses? This should represent the main body of the review.
- C. <u>How do you evaluate the book?</u> Do you agree or disagree with the author's arguments and why. Describe what you like or disliked about the book, including comments on the subject, writing style, organization, and use of sources.
