Marshall University would like to welcome you to the 49th Annual Appalachian Studies Conference located in Huntington, West Virginia, an urban centerpiece of the Tri-State Area, where three states, three major rivers, and one of the most significant dividing lines in U.S. history converge. One-fourth of the counties that comprise Appalachia are classified as rural—neither part of, nor adjacent to, a metropolitan area. Although separated in geologic space by our region-defining mountains and rivers, and in political space by state borders and bureaucratic subdivisions, the Appalachian Region has long served as a symbol of an alternative to the nation's

norms, the “best” and the “worst” of the American experience, and of endurance in the face of struggles economic, political, and natural. CONFERENCE SITE

Marshall University

As an R2 Carnegie institution, Marshall University serves the educational needs of both West Virginia and the greater Tri-State area of northeastern Kentucky and southeastern Ohio. An integral part of urban Huntington, Marshall University supports the region with a nationally renowned hospital system, a premier entertainment venue (the Marshall Health Network Arena), the Brad D. Smith Center for Business and Innovation, and the Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center. Offering degrees through both on-campus and online modalities, Marshall

University also operates a campus in Charleston, West Virginia. Marshall University has received national attention for its innovative “Marshall for All” program, an initiative to provide undergraduate students with a high-quality, debt-free university education.

Huntington, West Virginia

The second-largest city, just behind state capitol Charleston, “The Jewel City” of Huntington is located at the western edge of West Virginia. Although sharing many similarities with other urban Appalachian centers established in the late 19th century expansion of regional industry and commerce, Huntington (and its historical predecessor Guyandotte) is unique in its overlapping and evolving identities: an Ohio River trade locale, a frontier gateway of the early U.S., a portal between antebellum southern enslavement and northern freedom, an intentionally planned railroad hub, and a locus for healthcare, higher education, and the Arts.

Transportation and Parking:

The Marshall University campus is a pedestrian-friendly campus located less than a mile from the Huntington downtown area. Numerous parking options are available at no cost for any conference attendees who will be driving a vehicle to campus on Thursday, Friday, or Saturday. Handicap and accessible parking options are available near the main buildings where the conference will take place. Any parking lots or spaces that are designated accessible parking will require a handicap sticker or hang tag. Please respect this rule for the comfort and safety of any attendees with accessibility needs.

Getting to Marshall University:

The official address of Marshall University is:
One John Marshall Drive
Huntington, WV 25755.

If arriving by vehicle from I-64, take exit 11 for Hal Greer Boulevard/Downtown. Follow Hal Greer Boulevard to 5th Avenue, then turn right. The entrance to Marshall University will appear on your left. Most parking options will be available from 5th Avenue.

If you are driving or walking from downtown to the Marshall University campus, follow 4th Avenue to Hal Greer Boulevard/16th Street.

General Parking:

For general parking (not accessible) on campus, visitors may use any spaces not designated as handicap/accessible in the following lots:

6th Avenue Employee Parking Lot

Physical Address: 1638 6th Avenue
Huntington, WV 25703

When traveling by vehicle on Hal Greer Boulevard, turn onto 5th Avenue, then make an immediate right onto Elm Street. The lot will be on the corner on the right-hand side. Use the alley entrance to access the lot as there is no entry or exit to/from the lot from 6th Avenue.

Engineering Parking Lot

Physical Address: 1656 3rd Avenue
Huntington, WV 25703

When traveling by vehicle on Hal Greer Boulevard, follow the Boulevard through the intersection with 3rd Avenue to Commerce Ave. Turn right onto Commerce Avenue and follow for one block until you see a large lot on the left-hand side.

If traveling on 3rd Avenue, stay in the far-right lane, then turn right onto Hal Greer Boulevard at the intersection with 3rd Avenue. You will know when to turn right when you see a restaurant called Calamity J on the left corner and Firehouse Subs on the right corner of 3rd Avenue.

A crosswalk from the Engineering lot across 3rd Avenue is available in front of the Engineering Building. This will lead you to the heart of campus. The Memorial Student Center will be visible when looking straight ahead once you reach campus.

Stadium Parking Lot

Physical Address: Joan C. Edwards Stadium,
2001 3rd Avenue Huntington, WV 25703

When traveling by vehicle on Hal Greer Boulevard, turn onto 5th Avenue and move to the far-left lane. Turn left onto 20th Street, and you will see the stadium and a large parking lot on the right-hand side.

If traveling on 3rd Avenue, then turn left onto 20th Street. The stadium and lot will be immediately visible on your left-hand side.

From this lot, you will walk in the opposite direction of the stadium to reach campus. A crosswalk is available in the center of 20th Street and the Stadium lot to reach campus. Another crosswalk is available on the corner of 20th Street and 5th Avenue near CVS.

3rd Avenue Garage

Physical Address: 1801 3rd Avenue
Huntington, WV 25703

When traveling by vehicle on Hal Greer Boulevard, turn onto 5th Avenue and move to the far-left lane. Turn left onto 20th Street and remain in the left lane. Turn left onto 3rd Avenue, then you will see the garage on the right-hand side of the road.

Accessible Parking and Passenger Drop Off:

For any visitor who prefers a drop-off point close to the main buildings of the conference, two options are available.

The first is directly in front of the Memorial Student Center on the far-left side of 5th Avenue. There is a pick-up/drop-off/loading zone lane available here.

The second option is a loading zone/circular drive on John Marshall Drive between Drinko Library and the Memorial Student Center. From 5th Avenue, take a left onto John Marshall Drive. This area appears as number 32 on the [printable campus map](#). No parking is allowed here as this serves as a loading zone and fire lane.

Three parking lots are available for visitors with accessibility needs or handicap tags/stickers.

Pay-By-Space Parking Lot (first option)

Physical Address: 459 John Marshall Drive
Huntington, WV 25755

The primary accessibility lot is available on John Marshall Drive near Drinko Library and the Memorial Student Center. On the [interactive campus map](#), it is referred to as the Pay-By-Space Parking lot. Please note that

though there is a pay station in this lot, you **DO NOT HAVE TO PAY** to park in this parking lot. It is available free of charge for handicap and accessible parking.

Memorial Student Center Lot (second option)

Physical Address: 1680 5th Avenue
Huntington, WV 25703

The second-closest parking lot is located on the east-side of the Memorial Student Center and near the Campus Christian Center, number 36 on the [printable campus map](#). Some spaces are designated handicap and require a permit.

Sixth Avenue Parking Facility (third option)

Physical Address: 1650 6th Avenue
Huntington, WV 25703

The third option is recommended for any sessions that take place in the Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center (building 44 on the [printable campus map](#)).

A pick-up/drop-off lane is available on 5th Avenue for this building should that be a preference. If parking near the building is preferred, use the Sixth Avenue Parking Facility.

MU GUIDELINES REGARDING IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT (ICE)

At the time this program was finalized ASA has no knowledge of any anticipated or impending ICE-related actions on or near campus during the Conference.

Marshall University has developed a step-by-step guide in consultation with campus safety officials and legal counsel, outlining what to do if Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) or other law enforcement officers appear in a university setting.

If you encounter enforcement agents, focus on immediate priorities:

1. Notify campus authorities:
 1. Campus Safety / Campus Police (Chief Terry: 304-696-4357 or at terry@marshall.edu)
 2. Dean of Students or designated emergency administrator (VP of Student Affairs Marcie Simms: 304-696-4677 or at marcie.simms@marshall.edu)
 3. General Counsel's Office (Chief Legal Officer Toney Stroud: 304-696-2944 or at stroudh@marshall.edu)

2. Stay calm and encourage everyone to remain calm.
 1. Do not interfere with law enforcement
3. Manage the interaction through brief, neutral questions.
 1. "Hello, I'm the instructor. May I see your identification?"
 2. "Do you have a judicial warrant requiring entry to this classroom? Have you presented it to campus authorities?"
 3. "Campus Safety will assist you — please give me a moment to contact them."
4. If the encounter occurs in a classroom, manage everyone's reactions as much as possible.
 1. "Everyone stay seated and calm. Please do not approach the officers."
 2. "I'm required to notify campus safety — they will help us manage this situation."
 3. If class must be dismissed, you could say, "Class is dismissed for now. Please exit quietly and follow campus safety instructions."
5. As much as possible you should:
 1. Maintain a calm, safe environment.
 2. Try to keep everyone calm and prevent the situation from escalating.
 3. Visually inspect (but do not handle) any warrant presented.
 4. Defer to campus authorities once they arrive.

5. Protect everyone’s privacy — do not share personal information.
6. You should NOT:
 1. Block officers from entering if they insist.
 2. Interpret or judge the validity of a warrant.
 3. Ask anyone about their immigration status.
 4. Instruct anyone to run, hide, or resist.
 5. Negotiate or speak on behalf of the institution.

On November 14, 1970, 75 people died in the worst sports-related air tragedy in U.S. history, when a Southern Airways DC-9 crashed into the hillside nearby. Square Dance*

Way up on a mountain top in Letcher County
Kentucky, the Carcassonne Community

Center is home to the longest running square dance in Kentucky. Since the 1930's, Carcassonne dances have featured a unique Appalachian square dance called the Kentucky "Big Set". In this style, dances are done in one big circle as opposed to the traditional 8-person squares. These accessible dances feature traveling, "active" couples who form smaller circles of 4 around the larger circle of dancers. These groups of 4 dance through the figures, then progress to the next couple down the line. These dances are unique in that there is time for the non-active couples to either rest and watch or free-style flatfoot or clog. Varying physical abilities and dancing experience are all welcome!

Sarah will speak briefly about the history of the tradition of Kentucky Big Set dancing in Carcassonne, Kentucky while also placing Appalachian square dancing in the context of broader folk dance traditions from around the world. Then, we'll all dive right into a square dance!

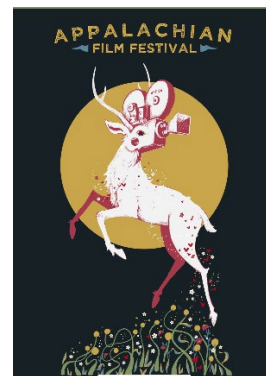

Central City Museum

The Central City Museum is a museum on a mission to weave the threads of personal stories and artifacts from industries into a professionally presented narrative history of the community. The vision of the Central City Museum is to contribute to the revitalization of the West Huntington neighborhood with a destination for residents and visitors that builds the significance of the area.

The Central City Museum was established in 2020 as a way to preserve and tell the rich history of Central City. The Central City Museum features a primary exhibit of glass, wood products, brewery memorabilia, and other items from the shops and businesses found in Central City from 1893-1950s. The primary exhibit is part of the programming at RenewAll's Cultural Wealth Hub located at 610 14ST W in Huntington. The many objects in the Central City Museum collection are artifacts of the craftsmanship and abundant natural resources of the region. Central City is now part of the West Huntington Neighborhood but was originally developed as an industrial midpoint between Huntington and Kenova to take advantage of coal and other natural resources traveling along the rail lines. Central City bought several farms and created a planned town centered on what is today known as 14th Street West. Glass factories, Barrel Makers, D.E. Abbott Framing Shop, Heiner's Bakery, the Fesenmeier Brewing Company, Soda Fountains, Hardware Stores, early Department Stores, and other businesses

filled the area with a bustling atmosphere. The Central City Museum is a program of RenewAll Inc., that serves a distinct destination for Heritage and Cultural Tourism.
